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FINDING BOOKS AND OTHER LIBRARY MATERIALS

OBIS is the Oberlin College Library's online catalog; it lists most library materials. Online borrowing is available through the **OhioLINK Library Catalog**, which combines the holdings of 120 libraries at Ohio colleges and universities, and through **SearchOhio**, which does the same for 28 Ohio public library systems. All three catalogs are searchable by **Author** or **Title** for a specific author or work, or by **Subject Heading** or **Keyword** for works about a topic, person, place, etc.

*Writers can be searched as both **AUTHOR** (for writings by the person) and **SUBJECT** (for writings about the person and her/his works):*

Murasaki Shikibu, 978?

*Suggested **SUBJECT HEADINGS** for related topics:*

Japan -- Court and courtiers

Japan -- History -- Heian period, 794-1185

also browse *Japan -- History* for later time periods, e.g., 1185-1600; Tokugawa period, 1600-1868; Restoration, 1853-1870; Meiji period, 1868-1912; etc.

Japanese literature -- Heian period, 794-1185

Art, Japanese -- Heian period, 794-1185

Comic books, strips, etc -- Japan

Graphic novels

Nō [general works about Nō plays and works that deal with the presentation of Nō plays on the stage]

Nō plays [text of Nō plays and works treating them from a literary point of view]

*Use **KEYWORD** and **ADVANCED** searches to find book chapters/articles, and works on multiple topics:*

manga

genji

manga and genji

Exercise: search OBIS for books

1. Start at library home page, <http://www.oberlin.edu/library>
2. Choose the CATALOG tab and change the drop-down search option to **AUTHOR**; search: murasaki shikibu
3. Change the drop-down search option to **SUBJECT**; search: murasaki shikibu
4. Click on Limit/Sort Search; for **LANGUAGE**, select English, and click Search
5. Change the drop-down search option to **KEYWORD**; search: genji

USING DATABASES TO FIND ARTICLES IN SCHOLARLY JOURNALS

Connect from Databases tab on the Library home page search box, or use the Quick Links drop-down menu

☆ *MLA International Bibliography*

Indexes books and periodical articles in world literature, folklore, and modern language

☆ *Bibliography of Asian Studies*

Indexes materials published worldwide on all subjects pertaining to East, Southeast, and South Asia

Academic Search Complete

Indexes articles from general and academic periodicals in all disciplines; over 80% of the journals indexed are peer-reviewed; almost 60% include full text

Humanities International Complete

Indexes journals, books, and other sources on all aspects of the humanities, with particular focus on literary, scholarly, and creative thought

Historical Abstracts

Indexes articles from journals on world history and culture from 1450 to the present; despite the official dates of coverage, many articles cover earlier historical time periods

Literary Reference Center Plus (published by EBSCO)

Literature Resource Center (published by Gale Group)

These two databases provide biographical, bibliographical, and critical content on literary figures and their works from all time periods and genres; information comes from reference works, books, and scholarly journals. Included are biographies, plot summaries, journal articles, reviews, and more

📖 **Exercise: search *MLA International Bibliography* for scholarly journal articles**

1. Start at library home page, <http://www.oberlin.edu/library/>
2. Choose the Databases tab; under the “by subject” drop-down search option, choose Literature
3. Find and select *MLA International Bibliography*
4. In box 1 enter search term for the first concept and click Search (i.e., *genji*)
5. In box 2 enter search terms for the second concept, each connected by “or,” and click Search

▷ To determine if the library has a particular journal, Use “360 Link to Full Text” or “Find It!” when available in research databases, or search for the title in **Journal Finder** tab on Library home page or from the Quick Links pull-down menu

SUMMON – first (and default) tab on library home page search box

- searches across the spectrum of library content: books, scholarly articles, newspapers, data, audio, video, images, government documents, and more; searches many, *but not all*, library resources
- draws from OBIS, OhioLINK, many full text and article indexing databases, and digital repositories from colleges, universities, research centers, and other open-access archives
- Subject-specific databases are generally better for complex or comprehensive searches
- OBIS and OhioLINK are generally better for finding books
- if links don’t lead to full text, be persistent or ask for help; we probably *do* have access

📖 **Exercise: searching Summon for additional publications**

1. Start at library home page, <http://www.oberlin.edu/library/>
2. Choose the Summon tab; in the Search box, type: *heian court*
3. Refine your search with the option “Limit to articles from peer-reviewed publications”
4. Refine your search further with the Subject Term “japanese literature”

Exercise for independent searching and sharing

1. Start at library home page, <http://www.oberlin.edu/library/>
2. Choose two of the resources you learned about in class today and search them for a topic you're considering writing about for your research paper
3. When we reconvene as a group, be prepared to share something with your classmates about at least one of the sources you investigated: something interesting or surprising you found, what your experience was like searching and using the resource, advice or suggestions about the resource

HOW TO GET MATERIALS NOT AVAILABLE AT OBERLIN

OhioLINK/SearchOhio

- how it works: 115 Ohio library systems lend materials (primarily books) to each other
 -  *does not include delivery of journal articles – see section below on ILL*
- to request: do-it-yourself online searching and requesting
- Barcode is the number on the back of your OCID (*not* your T-number)
- how long it takes: allow 3-4 business days
- loan period: 3 weeks + up to 6 three-week renewals if item has not been requested by someone else

Interlibrary Loan (ILL or ILLiad)

- use for: articles in journals not available at Oberlin, books not available from OhioLINK
- how it works: libraries lend materials to each other; journal articles are usually sent as scanned pdfs
- to request: select "ILLiad/Interlibrary Loan" from the Quick Links menu on the Library's home page; set up an account; enter and track ILL requests online
- how long it takes: allow 1-2 weeks, though many articles arrive much more quickly
- loan period: journal articles are yours to keep; loan period for books varies
