
## Kumano Kodō pilgrimage route




Canoeing in the Boundary Waters I have felt the spirit of the Voyageurs ...


Backpacking in Idaho near the Lolo Pass I walked in the footsteps of Lewis and Clark's "Corps of Discovery".




In the desert I have followed John Wesley Powell...








