Their mission is to create and educate, make change in broken systems, and promote self-advocacy and determination so that disability is recognized as a natural part of the human experience.

Riley Eaton interned as a research assistant under Dr. Sally Gould Taylor, the Executive Director and Associate Research Professor at the Institute on Disabilities. The main focus of Riley's research was on a Health Messaging study involving the development and implementation of focus group protocols with people with physical and intellectual disabilities. The study aims to reduce the disparate impact of COVID-19 on underserved populations in Pennsylvania through a community engaged approach to develop tailored health messages. It is one of the research projects under Temple's Health Equity Collaborative which is funded by the CDC and Pennsylvania Department of Health. Riley also contributed to a series of Person-Centered Planning meetings with incoming Temple students with intellectual disabilities as a graphic facilitator.

I was overall able to participate in this research opportunity at all because of the funding I received for the internship. I worked another (paying) job in addition to this internship in order to still be able to make money throughout the summer, however I would have had to work significantly more payed hours had I not received this funding. This may have prevented me from going in person for the focus groups throughout July, as well as contribute to the research analyses for publication. Being able to participate at all in this internship and research experience in a professional setting was made possible by the funding I received. In turn, I have had the opportunity to deepen my understanding of health equity and public health activism, and work on a research team to broaden my perspective of the pre-health and medical field.

Blekinge International Brass Academy:

The mission of this one-week intensive brass festival is to provide brass instruction of the highest quality to participants from over the world, as well as serving as a meeting point for some of Sweden's most motivated brass musicians, putting on six concerts and numerous clinics and master classes.

Abe participated in the Academy part of BIBA, for brass students at the college level. In a given day, he either played in masterclasses, group lessons, ensemble rehearsals, or orchestra excerpt classes. When he did not have anything scheduled for himself during a slot of time, he sat in on other lessons and masterclasses in which other high-level brass students where performing, and thus had the opportunity to gain even more knowledge by viewing other learn. He participated in a brass ensemble in which he premiered a piece specifically commissioned for BIBA, as well as played other repertoire. He also further developed and formed new relationships with motivated students at his level from mainly Sweden and Scandinavia, which have already proven instrumental to his own musical development.

National Youth Wind Band of Sweden:

The National Youth Wind Band of Sweden brings together musicians aged 15-25 from all over Sweden, with the goal being to create Sweden's best non-professional wind orchestra for two weeks.

Abe participated in the National Youth Wind Band on Principal Euphonium, which gave him an excellent opportunity to hone his euphonium skills in the right environment, as this skill is an important one to have as a trombone player. During the rehearsal period he rehearsed for seven weeks each day and additionally played in various chamber groups in his free time, as well as performed with these in an internal concert. The band played a total of seven concerts on their tour at the end of the second week, three in different cities across Sweden and four in Kerkrade, the Netherlands, where they also competed in Division 1 of the World Music Contest Kerkrade 2022. He got the opportunity to form close relationships with like-minded young people from all over Sweden, which will prove helpful at this stage in his life, especially since it allowed him to closely keep in touch with the Swedish wind and brass world despite spending the school years in the US.

<u>University of Pittsburgh Medical Center's Summer Res</u>earch Immersion

Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania

The Summer Research Immersion (SRI) seeks to get students involved in clinical research and the day-to-day reality of working at very high-end hospitals such as the UPMC conglomerate. The program has a few components: the research project, overseen by a UPMC mentor, hospital shadowing, guest lectures, and workshops. My research project is overseen by Dr. Kate Flickinger, of the UPMC Emergency Medicine department. We are comparing self-reported moods of post-cardiac arrest patients with scores from cognitive tests administered by providers. Most post-cardiac arrest (PCAS) patients suffer from the psychosocial effects of their condition, but many don't receive appropriate help, even though they often score in the depression range of cognitive tests. We are hoping to explore that discrepancy, and generate hypotheses to explain it, in the hope of helping as many PCAS survivors to get mental health support. As a culmination of the internship, I will present an abstract to a panel of doctors and fellow students.

The hospital shadowing is also an amazing opportunity to not only observe what a hospital routine is like, but also learn about different career tracks and consider different specialties. Similarly, guest lectures have covered a wide range of topics, from data analysis to career advice, and have allowed me to make connections within the medicine world. Finally, workshops are the hands-on counterpart of the lectures. Rather than just talking about different breathing tubes, we actually learned to put them on patients; after reading articles about the benefits of different IV fluids, we learned to do IVs ourselves, and got to do them on one another. Is is very rare that a college student gets to do any of this before medical school, and it gives me a whole new perspective on clinical articles I may read.

This experience would not have been possible without donor support. I am an international students, supporting myself through college. Without this funding, I would never have been able to afford living by myself this summer, as my Visa doesn't make me eligible for a lot of jobs that would have maybe been able to help. Still, this way I am able to focus all my energy on my career in medicine, and I am beyond thankful I get to have this experience.

Nantucket Shipwreck and Lifesaving Museum, Egan Maritime Institute

Egan Maritime Institute is a nonprofit organization on the island of Nantucket off the coast of Massachusetts that focuses on maritime education, heritage, and history. Through the Nantucket Shipwreck and Lifesaving Museum, the public is provided access to artifacts from the 19th and 20th centuries as well as dramatic stories of shipwrecks of the past and the bravery and heroics of lifesavers. At this museum, Lauren has had to take on many roles and responsibilities. She provides guided tours to visitors from all over the world as a docent, making the stories engaging and accessible to a wide array of visitors. As a docent, she had to have immense knowledge and understanding of specific Nantucket history and maritime history, giving her the opportunity and chance to research objects and peoples histories in more depth while sharing her passion for history with the visitors. This passion for history, combined with Lauren's interest in making museums and public institutions accessible to the broader public, has also made her a very successful Collections Assistant at the Shipwreck and Lifesaving Museum. As a Collections Assistant, Lauren has been responsible for a reinterpretation project of the museum as well as a research project relating to public programming. For the reinterpretation project, Lauren and the Collections Manager have looked at all aspects of the museum and have dissected it piece by piece, analyzing artifacts and their meaning in the context of the museum and its story. The end result of this project was a complete reorganization and interpretation of the museum that will aid in future renovations and reconstructions of the galleries. The other project that Lauren has been actively involved in is a research project that centered around specific stories relating to objects and artifacts in the museum, often building off of the information given on tours. Some of these stories included the lives of the divers that went down to the Andrea Doria, an ocean liner that went down in 1956 and remained on the bottom of the ocean in an area called the Mt. Everest of the Atlantic, and the domestic and social lives of women whose family (husband, brothers, and sons) were a part of the United States Lifesaving Service in the 19th century and how their day-to-day experiences differed to others on the island. While doing all of these duties, Lauren has had the opportunity to meet local Nantucket residents and share in their history, telling them more indepth stories and learning from a personal perspective about Nantucket's history.

Financial support has helped me immensely this summer. The burden of housing and dining has been lifted off of my shoulders by the award given to me. Prior to receiving funding, I was anxious about how I would afford housing on such an expensive island and how I would cover groceries as well. Young composers participated actively in rehearsals and coaching sessions of their 3 pieces, and attended all performance classes, masterclasses, and special guest lectures that Yellow Barn provided. Immersed in an environment of passionate musicians, and working with a faculty of established professors from top conservatories and universities, Yellow Barn was an experience of inspiration and remarkable growth in compositional skill, as well as the foundation of a network in the world of young musical artists that will continue to serve it's student participants throughout their lives.

UGE is a solar development organization that aims to expand the presence of solar fields in the US, some areas of Canada, and a few locations in the Philippines. Smaller teams at UGE work to seal deals, develop site plans, build the solar fields, and operate for up to 30 years. Sydney's formal title was a Development intern, so she worked closely with Development managers. However, Sydney was privileged to sit in on meetings with the Origination team, the Construction team, and the Investment Committee as well, getting a full taste of the solar development process. She worked with two other interns to complete various tasks assigned by people across UGE, gaining a lot more responsibility and independence as the summer progressed. For example, Sydney worked with the other interns to research the new field of Agrivoltaics in depth and present their findings to the team at UGE. She was also given outdated project charters (which includes a broad summary of a solar project) for solar field sites in Maine and worked with a development manager to find the appropriate information to update the charter. Sydney also worked on Process Documentation Workflows, which required making workflow charts of various company protocols to share with the entire team. Additionally, a development team member gave Sydney and the other interns lessons on using Helioscope, a modeling software to design solar panel site plans. These are just a handful of tasks that Sydney completed as she spent the summer familiarizing herself with the field of renewable solar energy and advancing the beginnings of her career path.

UGE has an office in Toronto, as well as in Manhattan; I spent my summer in the Manhattan office. When the pandemic hit, UGE's team was forced into remote work, as everyone was. This summer, UGE has began pushing for New York team members to make it back into the office for the work day -- It is much easier to work as a team when you can swivel your chair and chat with a collaborator, rather than waiting for an email back to coordinate a Zoom meeting. Financial support from my alumni donor fund gave me the resources to commute into the Manhattan office and take part of that team-working experience. Working in an office and being able to work side by side with full-time team members at UGE was an invaluable education experience, one unmatched by simply participating through a screen from my home. Additionally, physically being in an office with co-workers allowed me to form professional bonds with the team members at UGE, a relationship that is harder to form remotely. Further, work days at UGE were long, a full 9-5 day. Financial support from Alumni donors allowed me to fuel my brain with food, not worrying about how I might be able to get lunch, and rather focusing on my work and learning experiences with UGE.

This funding enabled Katia to attend the Harpa International Music Academy (HIMA) an annual classical music summer course in the Reykjavík, Iceland area, which brings together students from Iceland and internationally for ten days of intensive music study in both solo performance and chamber music. (The remaining funds will also go to support Katia's attendance at MusicFest Aberystwyth, a summer course in Aberystwyth, Wales, UK with a similar mission, which will take place in late July).

At HIMA, each day included morning practice and almost daily lessons, 2 hours of chamber music study after lunch, and a masterclass in the late afternoon (every student played in one masterclass). There was a mid-course chamber music concert taking place at the Garðabær music school (one of the buildings in which the course took place), and at the end of the course everyone had the opportunity to play both a solo and a separate chamber music piece in the Harpa Concert Hall in downtown Reykjavík. Katia's two chamber music pieces were by Mozart and Jessie Montgomery, and she also performed solo Bach at a masterclass and Rebecca Clarke's Morpheus at the final concert (as well as beginning to study the Bartók Viola Concerto). While at HIMA Katia studied with the two viola teachers on faculty, Pórunn Ósk Marinósdóttir (Principal Viola of the Iceland Symphony, for whom she also played in the masterclass), and Ásdís Valdimarsdóttir (on faculty at the Royal Conservatory of the Hague, Netherlands). For chamber music she worked with Ari Vilhjálmsson (Principal Second Violin of the Israel Philharmonic) and Sibbi Bernhardsson (Professor of Violin at Oberlin). She also observed masterclasses of some of the other faculty members. All of the faculty members that Katia worked with, she found to be incredibly inspiring and helpful and offered her much valuable advice, and Katia hopes to return and work with them in the future.

The festival also provided students the opportunity to see both the sights and culture of Iceland — in addition to a course-sponsored trip to Thingvellir National Park, students (including Katia) often did exploring in the Reykjavík area and beyond after classes for the day were over. Also most international students were placed with host families who lived in the area (Katia stayed with the family of the Icelandic Oberlin alumna Herdís Mjöll Guðmundsdóttir '21). Overall Katia found HIMA to be an enriching and eye-opening experience, and she hopes to return to the course and to Iceland next year.

Attending summer music courses, especially overseas, when the costs of flights, food, internal transportation, etc. is quite expensive. In addition, my family's financial situation is quite erratic, so it can be a struggle. However attending music courses each summer really contributes to my improvement as a musician and also enables me to make connections in different places, and I cherish the experiences I have this summer at the courses that I attend, particularly this one since this is my first summer attending music courses in Europe. Since I plan to study for my master's degree and hopefully to live in Europe after graduating, I feel that my summer experiences here are giving me valuable insights and connections into the music

world in Europe, and I am so incredibly grateful to the donor(s) supporting my time and studies in Europe this summer.

Sherborne Summer School of Music

Sherborne, England, United Kingdom

The mission of the Sherborne Summer School of Music, located in the medieval market town of Sherborne in Dorset, England, is to provide a place for musicians of all backgrounds to study with world renowned teachers, network with like-minded people, and improve their musical skills. Sherborne aims to create a friendly yet stimulating atmosphere for dedicated musicians to hone their craft. The specific area of the school that participant Brian Wacker attended was the orchestral conducting program, directed by Maestro Rodolfo Saglimbeni. Prior to the commencement of the program, Brian spent many weeks preparing the music and studying the eight different orchestral scores. The repertoire for this year's Summer School included works like Dvorak's 9th Symphony, "Appalachian Spring," Suite for 13 Instruments by Aaron Copland, Mozart's Symphony No. 40, and other core pieces of the orchestral repertoire. Several gems by Russian composer Alexander Borodin and the Englishman Peter Warlock were also studied. The first week of the program was called "Practical Conducting." It consisted of numerous classroom ensemble sessions, as well as a few full orchestra sessions. Through these sessions,, Brian and fellow conductors gained a solid foundation in basic technical and interpretative conducting skills. Brian also received individual lessons with the experienced tutors throughout the week, enhancing his baton technique, score-reading ability, and ear training. The second week, or "The George Hurst Conductors' Course" provided a more advanced level of training for the student conductors. When they were not on the podium leading the ensemble, they were participating in it as orchestral players or pianists. With his primary instrument being voice, Brian contributed to these ensemble sessions as a pianist. A typical day began with a warm-up focused on baton technique, the left hand, and use of the body. The majority of the classes after the warm-up were held in small groups, out of which workshop ensembles were formed for Brian and fellow conductors to gain experience conducting. The tutors offered helpful criticism and commentary in a masterclass format during these workshops. Several times during the week, the student conductors were allowed to conduct the large symphony orchestra at the Sherborne Summer School. These were remarkable evenings, for directing an ensemble of highly skilled musicians is an experience like none other. The days at the Sherborne Summer School were long, sometimes running from 9:00 AM to 9:30 PM, but they were always inspiring and invigorating. One of the greatest highlights of this program for Brian was conducting the large symphony orchestra and learning the long-established "Toscanini/Barzin" conducting technique from Maestro Saglimbeni. This technique has roots that stretch all the way back to the time of great composers like Franz Liszt and Richard Wagner. Wagner, in particular, is a favorite composer of Brian, and so he was thrilled with this aspect of the summer experience at Sherborne.

Financial support from the Class of 1965 Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Internship Fund has made all the difference in my internship experience. I come from a single-mother household and we scarcely make enough money to live on, let alone afford experiences like the Sherborne

Summer School of Music or a trip to England. The donor alumni fund is my only means of attending a summer experience this year. While it can still be worthwhile to remain at home for the summer, practicing music on my own and working part-time, I feel it does not compare to the value of traveling abroad to a celebrated summer music program. It is so important for aspiring professional musicians to put themselves out there in the world; to play, sing, or conduct for as many people as possible, and to learn from those who have already gone down the music path. Again, financial support from the donors has made every bit of the difference for me this summer. I now have the opportunity to focus my fullest attention on interpreting the music of Mozart, Copland, Beethoven, and Dvorak—instead of worrying myself to death about finances. The Class of 1965 Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Internship Fund has given me an opportunity to continue to make music at a high level, to pursue my passion, and to go all in on what is sure to be a life-changing experience at the Sherborne Summer School of Music.

Biomedical Research and Training Institute (BRTI)

Harare, Zimbabwe

BRTI is a Public Health Research Institute that implements research projects and provides training and support services in public health, biomedicine and health research mostly focusing on HIV/AIDS, TB, Malaria and operational research. Its mission is to promote the health and quality of life of the peoples of Zimbabwe through fostering research, training and research informed interventions in all fields that are relevant to essential national health needs. The main role of the BRTI is to provide the support that researchers in all aspects of health need to become effective in influencing policy.

BRTI has many projects and Tsitsi was involved in two of them. On Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays, she worked at Harare Central Hospital (second largest public hospital in Zimbabwe) with the AVAPAR project which was an assay validation of equipment for antimicrobial blood testing. On average, it took seven days for microbial results from patients' blood samples to be generated which was inefficient because by that time, most patients would've been discharged or deceased and the results wouldn't be of any use. The machine the project was testing would potentially reduce that time frame to one hour or one day at most which would make a huge change. Tsitsi's duties included analysing data from the two new machines and comparing them to the standard one, taking note of any inconsistencies and weather sensitivity that the new equipment has. Tsitsi also delivered the results to the patients and nurses in the wards which allowed her to interact with hospital staff as well as observe hospital conditions. Lastly, she helped to facilitate and evaluate the training of junior doctors and training nurses for collection of blood cultures in the neonatal units as there had been many contaminations there.

On Mondays and Wednesdays, Tsitsi worked at Ardent Creative, a creative agency that partnered with BRTI to use art as a means to engage the public in health issues. Ardent runs a competition called The Art of Heath Zimbabwe where they challenge young people to define health or tackle health issues using Art. Selected entries undergo a training bootcamp where they are mentored by artists and provided with resources they need to produce music, short films, spoken word poetry and other art tackling health issues. Tsitsi's duties included assisting with the preparation for the competitions. She also co-authored the plot, developed characters and a script for a 12 episode youtube mini-series tackling health in modern day Zimbabwe and was also responsible for running the auditions and picking the cast with a panel.

I am financially responsible for myself and some family members as I come from a low income family. The financial assistance has helped me immensely. Without it, I wouldn't have been able to pursue the internship as I wouldn't have afforded the cost of travelling back home. My internship is unpaid, and so the money has covered all my housing, transport and utilities costs

which has made my internship experience very convenient. I am deeply grateful for the financial support.
